The performance of all teaching staff is appraised by the end of each semester. The assessment is done by the students, Heads of the Departments and the Principal. This helps the staff to improve their teaching and learning strategies. The evaluation is done on a 100 point scale. The students give their ratings for 60 points. The Heads of the Departments rate for 30 points and the Principal rate for 10 points. The students give their feedback on ten parameters through online for the staff who handle their

done on a 100 point scale. The students give their ratings for 60 points. The Heads of the Departments rate for 30 points and the Principal rate for 10 points. The students give their feedback on ten parameters through online for the staff who handle their subjects. The students assess on the communication skill of the staff, do they complete their portions on time, discusses topic in detail, in the class have interaction with students, concentrates on academically weaker students, guide them in academic and non – academic matters and uses modern teaching aid. The Heads assess the staff based on their class room performance, their inter personal relationship in the department, their punctuality and contribution to the department. The Principal assess the staff on their overall performance both in academic and non – academic matters. The Heads of the Departments are being assessed by the students on 60 point scale and by the Principal on 40 point scale on the parameters mentioned above. The technical support staff are being assessed by the respective Heads of the Departments on a 50 point scale based on their performance in maintaining the laboratories, equipments in labs, rapport with the staff and students and their interest towards updating themselves with current techniques.

Every year alumni meet is being held on 15th August. The alumni meet with great enthusiasm and share their experiences and views. They give their feedback in the prescribed form which will be analysed by Board Members and suggestions implemented for the welfare of the students.

Feedback from parents are collected Department wise when partent – teachers meeting is held. The appropriate suggestions are instigated for students benefit.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The Institution has a centralised CIE system which conducts 3 cycle tests per semester for 75 marks. Each test mark is scaled down to 10 marks. The best of the three test marks is choosen as the CIA marks secured by the student for each subject.

Periodical Assignments and Seminars by students are being conducted to assess their performance Assignments of 5 marks are assigned for each.

A minimum of 75% attendance should be obtained by students to be eligible to appear in the University Examinations and a maximum of 5 marks is awarded to them based on their percentage of attendance.

The management has established systems and procedures for campus maintenance including both academic and supporting facilties. These physical, academic and support services and facilities cover almost every aspect of the college functioning such as teaching learning, buildings and class rooms, library, laboratories etc. The need of policy making arises from the expectation of constant, uninterrupted and smooth functioning of these services and facilities. The policy assures the optimum utilization and proper maintenance with a standard required specifications of physical, academic and support service facilities of the college to accomplish the high degree of excellence imbibing human values in all endeavours.

The physical facilities including Laboratories, Classrooms and Computers etc. are made available for the students those who are admitted in the college. The students seek admission to desired courses including a laboratory curriculum in which they are charged for the laboratory expenses at the time of the admission.
